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Club and Mountaineering Scotland AGMs

The Club AGM held on 13 November attracted 36 members. Draft minutes (to be confirmed at the 2025 AGM) are available on the Club Forum. Normal business was transacted fairly rapidly, with detailed accounts showing a deficit for the year of £1529 (2022-23 deficit £5689) despite relatively large expenditures for Muir, projects (footpath appeal, and MTS bursaries), and the Journal. Club assets as at 30 stood September 2024 at £103.723 (2022-23)£105,252). Membership had risen from 359 to 373. subscriptions (for 2025-26) were unchanged, but with higher Mountaineering Scotland affiliation fees (see below). Elections then took place "ordinary" for office-bearers and Committee members, with the results shown on the final page of this Newsletter. Ben Binnie CA was appointed as our new Independent Examiner. Under AOCB, the meat of the meeting was chewed, i.e. website revision, membership survey results, Muir improvements, new Journal editorship (Mark Norris), and possible Club incorporation.

The Mountaineering Scotland (MScot) AGM was held at Birnam on 23 November, Ken Thomson attending as (ex-)Secretary. As authorised by the Committee, he wielded the Club's 305 votes in favour of (a) the MScot Board nominees and (b) the £5 increase in the MScot fee for club members. The latter was justified in terms of "catch-up"

after two 3-year standstills in this fee (2016-19 and 2020-2023), in order to cope with rising staff salaries and rocketing insurance premiums. More detail in the MScot magazine *Scottish Mountaineer* or website.

Starting on Thursday 29th May, there will be the usual Mid-Week Walk, based in the Inverey area. Meet at the Inverey carpark at 10.30 (Kingswells Park & Ride at 9.00am) for a walk ending up at Muir Cottage for afternoon tea and a "fine piece".

It is hoped that many of the mid-week walkers will stay on to help with the Work Weekend, scheduled for Friday, into Saturday, and will be joined by others too. On Friday, a light lunch and a healthy evening meal will be provided for the workers, as a reward for their efforts in chopping and stacking wood, cleaning the interior, painting, bed-cover-changing etc.

With the hut booked by the Club for the whole weekend, it will also be open for Club members and their friends to book for the weekend, ending on Sunday with a Club BBQ. The aim of the BBQ is to raise some funds for the improvement works planned at Muir - and to showcase these works on an information board. There will still be time for Club members to influence these changes.

Huts

Our own Hut Custodian Eilidh Scobbie has taken on the role of convenor of the revitalised Mountaineering Scotland Huts Advisory Group, within which custodians exchange information and views on hut maintenance, usage, etc.

Day Meets take place once a month and can be by coach, mini-bus, car, or service bus. Meets are generally on Sundays but occasionally on Saturdays. Members should contact the Meet Organiser to book a place. The organiser or Day Meets Secretary can be contacted if any additional information is sought.

Meets generally leave Aberdeen at St. Margaret's School, Albyn Place, at 7am, with pick-ups possible on the route out (which may vary with meet location). Transfer to Ordinary Membership

The Club aims to "promote competence, safety, knowledge and responsibility of attitude amongst persons who engage in mountaineering". Our membership structure reflects this, with "Ordinary" and "Associate" memberships. Ordinary Membership (OM) recognises a basic level of experience and competence, "to look after yourself and to lead one or two others in all conditions normally encountered on the Scottish hills, without expecting any proficiency in the use of ropes". We hope most members will become OMs, but many join as Associates and never consider progressing to become an OM.

If you are an Associate Member with appropriate experience, why not apply now? We ask for a brief written declaration of experience and the support of two Ordinary Members - just send a completed Application Form (see website) to the Membership Secretary. If you wish to improve your skills first, please let our Training Officer know. We run various subsidised courses, including navigation and winter skills, and also offer financial support to attend some external courses, including at Glenmore Lodge.

Clachnaben Pathwork

In 2019-2020 the Club supplemented a £10,000 Heritage Lottery award with nearly £3000 of its own funds to arrange contractor repair of the popular "tourist" path up this hill, both alongside the wood, and above it. Last autumn, some Club members and others, organised and equipped by Eva Kupska of Outdoor Access Trust Scotland, undertook further small-scale repair work on the stretch above the wood, on land now owned by Aviva and managed by Scottish Woodlands, primarily clearing cross-drains and pulling out encroaching heather. Outdoor Access Trust for Scotland (OATS) Impact Review

This – the fancy new name for the OATS Annual Report – records work around Scotland, including the John o'Groats Trail, the car parks at Fairy Pools on Skye (177 vehicle spaces!) and at Stac Pollaidh, and the major An Tealleach path project. The several OATS projects in the Cairngorms include the new Invercauld-Braemar path, car parks at Dinnet and Beinn a'Ghlo, and pathwork on Meall a'Bhuachaille above Glenmore. Eva Kupska has taken over as the OATS Volunteer Coordinator (see Clachnaben item elsewhere), with over 250km of pathwork worth around £35,000 carried out by 55 volunteers. The It's Up to Us campaign has raised nearly £230,000 (but only 4% from clubs?!).

Lyme Disease

A short and readable article* on the above – primarily as it affects occupations such as forestry, but of interest to walkers – has been written by Dr James Douglas (based in Fort William, and a leading UK researcher into Lyme disease) and a FLS H&S manager. It reviews the disease's changing prevalence, and its prevention – primarily long trousers, and correct tick removal by twister or card. Mobile phones can be used to record skin rash etc. – and to look for ticks in those awkward-to-see places! A vaccine is projected for launch in 2027, and meanwhile there "remains much more benefit to health and well-being from life, work and recreation in green spaces than the small but important risks of tick-borne disease".

No Legs, No Limits talk, 17 April 2025

Glen Prosen

At a cost of around £20 million, this glen came into Forestry & Land Scotland (FLS) ownership in 2022, since when a Land Management Plan has been drafted and will go out for final consultation in spring 2025. About 14km of deer fencing around 8.7 hectares have been erected for river restoration, and tree planting in those enclosures will take place in 2025. However, deer management by shooting on the FLS estate remains limited (see Parkswatch 'Disaster' posting of 20 December 2024). Buildings in Glen Prosen are being leased, e.g. to a firm (Gin Bothy) and to a family. More at: https://forestryandland.gov.scot/angusglens. In October, timber harvesting started in neighbouring Glen Doll to clear windblow from the public trails around the White Water.

Cairngorms Nature Action Plan 2019-2024: Final Report

According to this report, highlights achieved by the Cairngorms Nature partnership were:

- Over 5,000 hectares (ha) of peatland restored
- Native woodland cover increased over 6,000 ha against target of 6000 ha
- Over 750 ha of plantations on ancient woodland sites enhanced
- Over 1,000 ha of habitat proactively managed for farmland waders
- Woodlands and grasslands enhanced on 27 farms
- A network of over 50 wetlands created but wader populations down by 25%
- Over 100 kilometres of river and riparian habitats restored (though target was 150 km) via 97 large wood structures, 24 wader scrapes, 60 debris dams, two bridge piers removed, 0.59 ha of riparian woodland restructured, and 10,000 native trees planted along the River Dee

"Amber" (or red*) status was recorded for wildcats, capercaillie, raptors, rare invertebrates (pinewood mason bee*), freshwater pearl mussel, woolly willow, *Hertelidea botrvosa* and *Alectoria ochroleuca** (both rare lichens). For more, see the National Park website.

The Monega Bothy

Richard Genner, a "bothy historian", is looking for information on the above bothy, which was located on the Monega Pass about a mile SE of the Glas Maol summit. A small wooden hut with a corrugated roof, it was described as "new" in 1958 but has since disappeared.
