125 Celebrations

Changes at Popular Visitor Centre

Glen Tanar Visitor Centre is set to provide a much improved and dynamic experience for the thousands of people who visit the popular Deeside Glen every year following the completion of a £150,000 refurbishment. The new look centre, which is more sustainable and accessible as a result of the renovation work, was unveiled at an official opening in August. The centre has been completely transformed, with fascinating visual and audio-visual displays about Glen Tanar, its geography, wildlife and people. It is also the permanent base for the Glen Tanar Ranger Service. Glen Tanar Charitable Trust, which owns and operates the centre, determined to put more of an educational and social focus on its activities, and believes that the improvements will help people gain a greater understanding and enjoyment of the Glen. The refurbishment has been made possible as a result of funding from the Trust, Cairngorms Outdoor Access Trust, Scottish Natural Heritage, Cairngorms National Park Authority and finance from the Scottish Government and the European Community Cairngorms Local Action Group LEADER 2007-2013 Programme.

The interior of the centre has been completely overhauled, with a bright and fresh open plan appearance which is much more suited to working with groups in a more sociable setting. For more information on the Glen Tanar Ranger Service, visit the ranger blog, email or call 013398 86072.

Mar Lodge Estate Draft Management Plan:

In June, Club representatives attended a meeting at Mar Lodge to discuss the Trust's Draft Management Plan 2012-16 for the Estate. Other participants included representatives from the Cairngorms Campaign (Drennan Watson), Ramblers Scotland (Dave Morris), the John Muir Trust, RSPB Scotland, the MCofS (Ron Payne), and the NTS HQ and local staff. Much initial discussion focussed on the proposed fence stretching NW from the Linn of Dee, and aimed at keeping deer for shoots on the moorland to the west (not at keeping them out of the woodland regeneration zone, where a zero tolerance regime is becoming effective). Later stages of the meeting briefly covered paths, bothies and bridges. Points of particular Club interest included: a "preferred option" for Derry Lodge to be announced (possibly with reinstatement of the bridge over to Luibeg Cottage); current Trust opinion in favour of removal of the Garbh Choire shelter, and against a bridge over the Geldie; riparian woodland blocks up the Geldie to improve water quality for fish; NTS consultation processes to be improved.

Subsequently, the Plan was put out for formal consultation earlier this year. The Club's response covered some of the above points (but not the deer fencing, which is hotly contested by the Cairngorms Campaign).

Subject to conditions related to otters, salmon, public access, etc., the Cairngorms National Park Authority has recommended the granting of planning permission to Invercauld Estate to shift about 400m of landrover track away from the river (where wheel ruts have developed, and the bank may collapse in time) to a drier stretch at about GR 188018, and to revegetate the existing track. 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Cairngorm Club Footbridge

On Friday 3 August a work party consisting of eight members from the Cairngorm Club did some restoration work on the Cairngorm Club Footbridge near Aviemore. The bridge spans the Allt na Beinne in Rothiemurchus Forest and allows walkers in the famous Lairig Ghru mountain pass to keep their feet dry!

It had been opened exactly 100 years earlier, funded by Club members and friends at a total cost of £94 4s 6d. Adorning the bridge are two plaques, one noting who erected the bridge and the other giving details of distances and timings of routes from the bridge between Aviemore and Braemar. The plaques were badly in need of repainting, and have been re-enamelled by Aberdeen Fabrications Ltd at no cost to the Club. On Friday the plaques were replaced and the bridge was repainted. by Shona Lindsay, Anne Pinches, Kees Witte, Peter Aikman, Derek Pinches, Sandy McIntosh, Brian Davey and Richard Shirreffs, while Ken Thomson was involved in removing the plaques for the repainting.

Re-Topping

Adventure Licensing

In spring 2012, the Club submitted its views to a Scottish Government public consultation on what should replace the UK-wide Adventure Activities Licensing Authority when it is abolished. In June, an analysis of responses was published (http:// www.scotland.gov.uk/Resource/0039/00396133.pdf). The Club, along with some other mountaineering organisations, had argued for a non-statutory accreditation scheme, the MCofS for a voluntary code of practice, and the Ramblers for a statutory scheme. The Minister has announced that a statutory scheme will be maintained in Scotland, largely due to local authority and education wishes to provide parental reassurance. This will affect mountain schools, guides, etc., but sports clubs will continue to be exempted. Meanwhile, the English authority (the HSE) has announced that it is "pausing" the abolition proposal!
