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A Midweek Walk with a Difference

Thursday 25th August saw some 22 Club members and their guests on a bus heading up Cairn o'Mount to enable us to walk from Glen Dye car park to Clattering Brig. It was a little like a Sunday school picnic that most of us would have attended in our childhood, with much chatter on the way out and the way back – but no streamers or balloons. We were blest with a lovely autumn day, warm, but not baking hot, and with the hills turned purple by the blooming heather.

The reason for my choosing to lead this walk was the publicity that had been given to the purchase of much of Glen Dye estate by Aviva as part of their eco mandate. Press reports were to the effect that the glen would soon be covered by forestry, and this seemed a good opportunity to walk the glen in its entirety, before that happened. The week before the event, I spotted a press report that Scottish Woodland Ltd (the forestry management company with the contract) were running community consultations, including a presence in Glen Dye to speak to hill users on the 25th. A couple of emails later, I had organised that Megan Parker, a senior Forest Planner with Scottish Woodlands, would give us a presentation at the Charr Bothy (our lunch stop) on their plans for reforesting (largely native trees and with limited commercial woodlands),

peat restoration, and new paths. Megan took questions from us too – so it was quite stimulating to hear of the plans on site (more information on page 14).

might be made available after construction), and uphill beside the Landerberry Burn onto the summit ridge track. The windfarm would be visible over a wide stretch of Aberdeenshire, from Aberdeen City to Tarland, and from higher ground near Inverurie and Finzean. The report, with visibility maps etc., is available at www.hilloffare-windfarm.co.uk. Consultee responses should be made to the Energy Consents Unit, which will issue a Scoping Opinion before the next stages, e.g. an Environmental Impact Assessment, Ministerial consideration and probably a Public Inquiry.

Climbing Update

The dry summer was ideal for climbing, when it wasn't too hot! Tuesday meets were well attended, typically half a dozen up to a full baker's on some occasions. A number of crags new to the normal schedule were added. A particular highlight was Yellow Crag by Newtonhill. This recently developed sport climbing venue boasts a rare south facing wall, shelter from winds <u>and</u> 25m long routes (triple the height of some local 'crags').

The Club has donated £1000 to the North East Bolt Fund. The fund is topped up by clubs and individuals in order to provide a source of funding new sport climbing development. Our donation was well timed as the fun was hit by a large outlay for the replacement of a tired and abused hammer drill. £1000 would be enough to equip 10 medium length routes with the required permanent hardware. Yellow Crag mentioned above was only possible due to the bolt fund.

This winter will see Tuesday meets replaced with Wednesday meets at Transition Extreme (TX are no longer open on Tuesdays). Starting November, the first meet of the month will be at RGU on a Tuesday.

I have been in contact with Aberdeen Mountaineering Club who are looking to petition TX to re-open on a Tuesday evening. A joint approach has been proposed in order to improve leverage. If successful, this would allow both clubs to continue operating their Tuesday meets over winter.

Anindya Mukherjee ("Raja") Book

During lockdown, two of our Wednesday evening talks came to us "live" from Kolkata, when the talk by mountaineer Raja gave us a different dimension on life. Raja has now published a book in English - "Sahara Soliloquies". As the title suggests, it is more a travelog about his cycle trip across the Sahara than a mountaineering blog but it takes us to a part of a world where few of us will go. The book is easy to buy online through Amazon.

Glen Dve Moor Project

This project, on behalf of the pension fund Aviva, covers about 6,300 hectares (ha) of forestry and degraded peatland around Clachnaben. From north to south, it extends from the Water of Avon around the hill of Meikle Strathvella, across and including the summit of Clachnaben to Charr Bothy in Glen Dye, and then south-east to the Cairn o'Mount road summit. Eastwest, it goes from the Spital Burn car park on the Cairn o'Mount road to Mount Battock. This excludes the area around Glendye Lodge, along with the current Quarry car park, and the flats and trees west of Glen Dye Lodge. Thus only the final and steeper section of the "tourist route" up Clachnaben falls inside the area of the Project, which involves:

- Peatland restoration on around 1,800 ha, including the main Clachnaben - Mount Battock ridge with its "peat canyons", to involve drain blocking, reprofiling, and revegetation.
- Woodland creation (both productive conifer planting and native woodland) of about 3.000 ha, to involve ground preparation (but no ploughing), a single fence around the whole area (with gates and stiles), natural regeneration, and planting.
- "Community/People" ideas involving multi-use track/path maintenance and perhaps construction; Charr Bothy (with extended MBA lease); car park improvements (e.g. at the Spital Burn), and waymarking west of Clachnaben towards Mount Battock on one or more routes back to Spital Bridge.

Hill of Fare Windfarm Proposal

A "scoping report" has been submitted for a proposal to erect 17 turbines at the western end of the summit plateau of the Hill of Fare, roughly around and south-east of Tornamean (458m), the highest point of the Hill. The turbine height – 250m from ground to blade tip – would require aviation lighting on some of the masts. (Equivalent numbers for existing and planned* windfarms are: Meikle Carew near Netherley 12 and 70m; Mid Hill I and II west of Stonehaven 33 and 125m; Fetteresso* ditto 10 and 200m; and Glen Dye* 26 and 150m.) The Hill of Fare development would also involve turbine foundations, crane pads, upgraded and new access tracks, underground cables, an anemometry mast, a control building and substation, a storage/battery compound up to ~100m x 150m in area, temporary borrow pits and construction/storage compounds, and drainage and signage. Access would be from the east, where parking on the B977 currently takes place for walkers and bikers (and where off-road parking

Fourth Cairngorms National Park Partnership Plan, 2022-2027

This Plan involves three "themes", each with "outcome(s)" and "priorities" for achieving these:

- *Nature*: a carbon-negative and biodiversity-rich Park with ecosystems functioning better, better connected and more resilient, via: achieving a net-zero Park; at least 50% managed principally for ecological restoration by 2045; increasing peatland restoration by 38,000ha and woodland by 35,000ha by 2045; and restoring river systems and ecological networks.
- *People*: a wellbeing economy that works for all the people of the Cairngorms, via: at least 200 volunteer rangers by 2030; increased physical activity levels of the 25% least active Park residents by 2030; the highest proportion of Living Wage employers in rural Scotland by 2030; and more apprenticeships within the Park.
- *Place*: a Park that people want to live in, work in and visit, via: 75% of new housing built for social rental and / or mid-market rental, and directly linked to local employment by 2030; a maximum of 15% of all housing stock to be second homes, or vacant or short-term lets by 2040; 50% of visitor and resident journeys within the Park not taking place by car by 2030; and 25% of visitors getting to the Park by public transport by 2045.
