DAY MEETS

There have been four day meets over the summer months, and since the last newsletter.

Back in June, Tom Litterick oversaw our annual midsummer overnighter in the Mamores. Club members took the opportunity to spend the night high in the mountains and take in several Mamores peaks over the weekend.

In July there were centenary celebrations for the Lochnagar indicator. Ken Thomson organised the event, and many members and guests joined him to mark the occasion. More detail on this event on page 14 of this Newsletter.

Our August meet was a trip to the Creag Meagaidh mountains, organised by Vay Mutch. A group of 6 members shared cars and joined her for a west to east traverse of the range with an overnight stay in Coire Ardair in the heart of this group of hills. During two contrasting days of weather (Saturday: wind, rain and mist. Sunday: calm, clear and sunny), the group took in 5 Munro summits.

Then on Sunday 8th September, our traditional Cairngorm traverse took place from north to south. Guy Bromby organised this well attended meet. Club members (some seasoned traversers, some new) enjoyed fine late summer weather on the route up and over Ben Macdui. Always an epic hike.

Glenmore Parking Charges

Proposals to impose parking charges and restrictions on the road past Loch Morlich and up to the ski area have been watered down. Longer periods, including overnight parking, will be allowed in the Pay and Display bays, and restrictions will operate from 1 March to 31 October, not all year. The charges now proposed for the bays between the Reindeer Centre junction and the Hayfield car park will be £3 for 3 hours, £4 for 6 hours, and £5 for 24 hours.

A Question of Masts

With support from 40-odd Club members, Ken Thomson planted a question at the National Trust of Scotland AGM held in Kirkcaldy on 20 September: "Under the UK-wide SRN (Shared Rural Network) programme, many masts, along with associated generators, solar panels, wind turbines, access tracks, etc., are being proposed in order to provide 4G coverage even in remote "wild" areas with no local demand, and little or no human landscape features. These include sites on NTS properties such as Mar Lodge Estate and Torridon. What is the Trust's attitude to such proposals, and what action is it taking to approaches by contractors for access to such sites?".

At the AGM, the question was read out by the chair (no text provided or photos shown) and dealt with rather anodynely. However, in conversation afterwards, a senior NTS staff member was rather more forthright: NTS are concerned that some masts will damage landscape, and have tried (going as far as the Land Tribunal in one case) to obstruct or at least to re-site these, as appropriate. The proposed Lui Beg mast is "high" on their list, along with others at Torridon and Kintail (4 or 5 masts).

Muir Cottage

The Hut Custodian has recently reported that work had been carried out by a local plumber following issues with the temperature of the water in the Men's and Women's washrooms.

She also reports that a reasonable 4G signal is now available for most networks, which will enhance the visitor experience, if they so wish.

Day Meets

Day Meets take place once a month and can be by coach, mini-bus, car, or service bus. Meets are generally on Sundays but occasionally on Saturdays. Members should contact the Meet Organiser to book a place. The organiser or Day Meets Secretary can be contacted if any additional information is sought.

Meets generally leave Aberdeen at St. Margaret's School, Albyn Place, at 7am, with pick-ups possible on the route out (which may vary with meet location). Departure times and cost are listed on pages 8 and 9 of this Newsletter. On all Meets, an organised "President's Party" walk will be available for those new to the Club or for members who simply want a day out without the challenge of route-finding or navigation. The following Day Excursions are offered for Winter 24/25.

November 3, Ben Vrackie (Sunday)

The minibus will leave at 7am from St. Margaret's and will head south on the A90 and onwards to Pitlochry/Moulin. The path we will follow will be the traditional route north past Loch A'Choire from Moulin to the summit of the Corbett at 841m. The view from the summit is excellent towards the Cairngorms and Beinn a'Ghlo. On the return we will backtrack our steps to the loch where we will make a detour west before joining the track back to Moulin and the Hotel. Distance is around 10km, duration 4hrs +. December 8, Morven Traverse (Sunday)

The minibus will leave St. Margaret's at 8am, with pick-ups possible along the North Deeside Road. The walk will start from the highest point on the A939, and go east over Cairnagour Hill and Mona Gowan onto Morven. From the summit, we will probably descend to Groddie in the east, but possibly – depending on conditions and wishes – south via the Culsten Burn to Tullich and Ballater. Transfer to Ordinary Membership

The Club aims to "promote competence, safety, knowledge and responsibility of attitude amongst persons who engage in mountaineering". Our membership structure reflects this, with "Ordinary" and "Associate" memberships. Ordinary Membership (OM) recognises a basic level of experience and competence, "to look after yourself and to lead one or two others in all conditions normally encountered on the Scottish hills, without expecting any proficiency in the use of ropes". We hope most members will become Oms, but many join as Associates and never consider progressing to become an OM.

If you are an Associate Member with appropriate experience, why not apply now? We ask for a brief written declaration of experience and the support of two Ordinary Members - just send a completed Application Form (see website) to the Membership Secretary. If you wish to improve your skills first, please let our Training Officer know. We run various subsidised courses, including navigation and winter skills, and also offer financial support to attend some external courses, including at Glenmore Lodge.

Wildfires in the Cairngorms

As announced in the June Newsletter, the Cairngorms National Park Authority carried out a wide-ranging consultation in spring 2024: a total of 1,664 online responses and 18 written responses were received. 79% of all respondents supported the introduction of a byelaw, a majority the year-round option. However, given the low fire risk during winter, and the difficulties of communication and enforcement, the CNPA Board was asked in June to support the development of a seasonal Park-wide fire management byelaw, to be followed by further formal consultation and then Ministerial approval. Muirburn will be covered by individual licences under new legislation.

Seals Ahoy!

In spring 2024, a grey seal was spotted in the River Dee at Kincardine o'Neil - 45km upstream, the furthest on record. Whilst in the river, it foraged upside down! Common seals are also present in the river: "no. 18" is a regular individual between Upper Drum and Kingcausie.

Saunders Lakeland Mountain Marathon - Haweswater Fells 2024

Four members of the Club took part in the SLMM early in July this year.

For the uninitiated the idea is to complete a two-day orienteering style event carrying all the equipment and food you will need. The check points and overnight camp are only disclosed after the start! There are several courses to enter of varying lengths and amount of ascent. This year the event was centred in the area north of Haweswater.

Ian Hamilton and Alec Erskine entered the score course. This course involves choosing which of the check points of varying values to visit in a given time limit. They were 49th out of 119 starters overall and 24th out of 53 starters in the veterans class.

Mark Peel and Rod Campbell entered the somewhat easier Wansfell course which is a linear course in which check points must be visited in a set order. They were 81st out of 110 starters overall and 18th out of 47 starters in the veterans class.

The teams were blessed with good weather on both days, with one or two light sprinklings to cool them down. There were interesting navigational and route choice problems on both days, all in an atmosphere of friendly competition.

While Rod, Ian and Alec were old hands, Mark is a new boy with the bit in his teeth and is seeking partners for more of the same! Good practice for our overnighters!

Ian and Alec stayed on in the Lakes to do a few rock-climbing routes on the Monday just to loosen up.

Munro Compleation

I was accompanied by family and friends and enjoyed a fine day and stayed at Inverardran Cottage, OMC, Crianlarich."

Duncan Macrae Legacy

Joining in 1954, Duncan was a well-known Life Member of the Club, latterly residing in Ballater until his death in August last year. We have recently been told that he bequeathed £2000 to the Club: the Committee has not yet considered whether this should be used for any special purpose.

Shelter Stone Visitor Book Replaced

In June 2024, after it became almost full, the 48-page waterproof Visitor Book left under the Shelter Stone in late July 2022 was replaced. A rough analysis of the information left in this book reveals 125 entries listing about 307 people (not dogs and mice), of whom 53 (17%) stayed overnight under the Stone, several being Club members. Another 9% camped nearby, and 6% recorded climbing a nearby route. Of course, many more people will have visited the Stone, and may not have noticed, or written in, the book. After the necessary drying and de-fumigation, the book is being archived, along with older versions, in the Club Library at Kings College.

Lochnagar Indicator Centennial Event, Saturday 13 July, 2024

As posted with photos on the Forum (see under Day Meets), a total of 23 Club members, plus 4 guests and members and friends of the Levack family (see below), started out from the Spittal of Glen Muick to commemorate the erection, almost exactly 100 years previously, on 12 July 1924, of the viewpoint indicator on the summit of Lochnagar. The weather was cloudy but mainly dry, so that walking conditions were generally good. Up at the Gelder col, the breeze was stronger, and as usual even more so at the foot of the Ladder. Those who persevered found the wind less strong as they made their way up to Cac Carn Beag, where a distant wailing resolved itself into cheerful bagpipe music. Altogether, there were at least 40 people on and around the summit rocks to be addressed by both the current President Helen Russell and by Richard Levack (grandson of Dr J. R Levack, Club President in 1924), followed by a small tumbler of very acceptable Lochnagar whisky kindly provided by Club member Graham Watt.

Three Planning Matters

A "Proposal of Application Notice" (ENQ/2024/1285) has been received by Aberdeenshire Council (but may be referred to the Park Authority) for works to "restore" the Dee between the Quoich and Braemar. These would include removal of the embankment on the north side of the river, and the creation of wetlands and islands south of Allanmore. A (second) public meeting is to be held in Braemar Village Hall at 4-7pm on 29 October 2024.

It is understood that application may be made to raise the level of Loch Muick, in order to ensure water supply to the hydro works just above the Falls of Muick in dry periods. This seems likely to mean path alterations at the head and perhaps the foot of the loch.

Work at Bovaglie has commenced, with the new diversionary path established through the wood behind the houses.

The 'Sawdust Fusiliers'

The above is the title of a small (130pp) booklet in the University Library, recording the World War Two activities in the Scottish Highlands of the Canadian Forestry Corps (CFC). It was written by William C. Wonders, a Canadian geographer who died in 2011; his name is attached to the largest academic map collection in Canada. Out of 33 camps in Scotland as a whole, there were six on Deeside, at Blackhall (west of Banchory), Ballogie (two camps), Glentanar, Abergeldie (near Pannanich) and Mar Lodge (west of Muir Cottage). The district HQ was at Aboyne, and training courses were held at Park House, Drumoak. The relative openness of cultivated Scottish forests compared to natural Canadian ones helped, and social relations were excellent, but rain and boggy ground often interrupted operations, and the men had to be told to cut close to the ground rather than higher up. Deer Culling

NatureScot has launched two pilot schemes to support the control of deer. These will enable qualified and eligible deer stalkers to receive a payment for additional deer culled over and above the level currently controlled in the area, and thus help to achieve an increase in the national cull of 25% or 50,000 deer each year across all species, as needed to achieve Scottish Biodiversity Strategy targets. One pilot covers an area north of Glasgow and west of Stirling, and will focus on lowland and urban roe deer as well as expanding red deer populations. The second will cover an area on the south-eastern side of Loch Ness, and focus on invasive non-native sika deer in native and commercial woodland. The Cairngorms National Park Authority will run a third scheme to reduce red deer hind numbers in the Park.
